"Measuring Time" is the theme of this year's Chelsea Festival, with concerts exploring the different relationships of composers with time. Judging by his brilliant and witty "Clocks for Piano and String Quartet" Miguel de Águila's own relationship might be summed up as: Time is what you can get away with. Played with panache by the pianist Melinda Lee Masur and the Verona Quartet the final movement became a delicious sticky-fingered fairground dance, a gaudy, virtuosic whirl spun from stolen time. *CORINNA da FONSECA-WOLLHEIM*
